

5th Annual WNA Cleanup MAY 3rd

Collection will be from 8 a.m. to Noon

On Saturday, May 3, 2008, from 8 a.m. until Noon, the Witherbee Neighborhood Association's 5th annual neighborhood-wide area cleanup will take place, rain or shine.

WNA will kickoff the cleanup event at 48th & "M" with coffee, refreshments and pastries provided by our corporate sponsor, Braeda[®] Fresh Express Café, located at 4901 "O" Street.

For the first time, this year's cleanup will offer curbside pickup of acceptable waste items. Jay Carter Refuse and Niederhaus Brothers Refuse Inc. will be donating their services to make this possible. Each will canvass assigned areas of the neighborhood, block-by-block, and pick up acceptable waste items at the curb free (NO household trash/garbage, yard waste or business waste will be picked up).

In addition to curbside pickup, large roll-off waste containers will be located on the north side of Hawthorne Elementary School on "M" Street, between 48th and 50th. Neighborhood residents are encouraged to bring their larger waste items to this location where volunteers will unload them. Recyclable items such as metal appliances,

I will need your name, address, time of sale and 25 words of what you are selling. *Please use the convenient coupon at bottom of this page.*

Tips for your sale:

- Collect what you want to sell over a few weeks; clean them, and put them in boxes or neat piles in one area of your home. Put similar items in the same box so you can decide on the proper price for all of them, not making a mistake by pricing one ring at ten dollars and a similar one at fifty cents. You also need to collect plastic and paper bags so your customers can easily carry away everything they want to buy.
- Pricing can be done when you collect the items to sell, or a day or so before the sale. You might want to research the prices by going to other garage sales or to www.ebay.com. You can put prices on individual items or make small signs for items in boxes. People like to know what things cost and will be less likely to walk away once they see the tag if you are too busy to tell them the price. You can price bigger items at slightly higher prices because people like to bargain.
- Before the sale, get several rolls of quarters, dimes and nickels, and at least 20 one-dollar bills. Get a covered box for your cash, with dividers for the different denominations, especially for a very large sale. Write down your initial amount and store it in the box so you can determine your profit when the

NIFA representative to speak at June Meeting

Our speaker for the meeting in June is no stranger to Witherbee Neighborhood Association (WNA). Cindy Trautman along with her husband Gregg met with WNA a couple of years ago to seek input for their planned development of their property on 37th and O Street. Those efforts paid off in a successful addition to the neighborhood instead of a confrontational situation. Cindy is not coming to speak about this however; she is coming to introduce Nebraska Investment Financial Authority (NIFA) to help support our emphasis on home ownership in the neighborhood in our programming. Our own Steve Schwab stated that his first home was through a program similar to NIFA.

NIFA provides Nebraskans a broad range of financial resources for home ownership, rental housing, agriculture, manufacturing, medical, and community development endeavors. NIFA also provides technical assistance for activities related to those areas, while preserving and growing the asset base used to provide these resources. NIFA's Single Family Homewnership Program offers eligible buyers 30-year mortgages with below market rates and assistance with the process of obtaining a mortgage loan. The Bar-None Housing Program may also be of interest to first-time homebuyers, and may be coupled with NIFA's Single Family program.

Cindy Trautman joined Nebraska Investment Finance Authority (NIFA) in May, 2003 as the Assistant Single Family Program Manager. She is responsible for managing the loan pipeline performance, the loan funding process, lender training, is the real estate agent liaison, teaches the realtor continuing education class and supervises the Single Family staff.

Cindy has been in the housing field for 21 years with a strong finance and housing background. She began as a real estate agent and then chose to diversify her experience by becoming a mortgage loan officer, and has always been a strong advocate for the first time homebuyer.

Cindy has been an active member of the Nebraska Realtor's Association and the Realtors Association of Lincoln since 1987 and is currently a member of the Affordable Housing Committee. She was a mayoral appointee and developing member of the Workforce Investment Board for Lincoln and Lancaster County and a member of the Executive Committee of the Workforce Development Board and an Ambassador with the Lincoln Chamber of Commerce.

Look for the sign in Cheryl's yard at the northeast corner of 50^{th} and L if you forget the date.








UNL Big Event Teams With WNA

The 3rd annual UNL Big Event was held on Saturday, April 12, 2008, and it involved many different community projects, including a litter pickup project in the Witherbee neighborhood.

At 9 AM on the day of the Big Event, six volunteers from the Witherbee neighborhood met with thirteen UNL student volunteers at the southeast corner of S. 48th & 'M' Street. Ten areas were designated within the neighborhood, from S 33rd to S. 56th and 'O' to Randolph Streets and volunteers were each assigned an area to help with the initial spring litter pickup and collection.

Collecting litter along the curb of neighborhood streets, sidewalks and removing illegal signs from utility poles was done as part of a mini-grant received from the Keep Lincoln Lancaster County Beautiful program.

This neighborhood improvement project was completed within three hours and over 500 hundred pounds of litter was collected. WNA is thankful to all those who volunteered and to the six fifth grade 4-H students who took pictures of the cleanup.

Four kids, a job, a full time student, and a new homeowner

Claire Ellis is a remarkable young woman. On February 23rd, 2007 at age 22, she became a homeowner. Only eleven years earlier her future may not have seemed quite so bright. When Claire was 11 years old she became a ward of the state and entered the foster care system. She says that "not all foster parents are in it for the right reasons; some are interested only in the state check. So I ended up running away a lot." Luckily Claire found a good family to run to. She often babysat their kids and ended up practically living there. By the time she was 16 she had permission from the state to stay there with her "new" family legally. Then in 2004 at the age of 19 her "new" parents were incarcerated and Claire worried her "new siblings" would also end up in the foster system. So she became their legal guardian; now Claire was responsible for her own daughter and four other kids.

A couple of years later while Claire was working for a general contractor one of the employees gave her a book about investing and building equity. Claire says "I started thinking about purchasing a house and planning for my family's future. I started looking at cheap houses, then I started looking at NIFA and found information on NeighborWorks Lincoln on their website. I decided it wouldn't hurt to call and find out if I was financially ready to buy a house."

At the time she started looking at purchasing a house they lived in a duplex on south west A street. It was owned by Lincoln Action Program and they were receiving housing assistance. "I wanted to move and find a better environment for the kids. It wasn't a bad place we were living in, but people were constantly moving in and out, police were called on a regular basis...sort of caught in a cycle of poverty." Claire says that she initially liked the NIFA homebuyer program because they had really low interest rates, but she didn't have the required money for the down payment. With NeighborWorks she only needed to save \$1,000.

After applying to the program to see if she was financially able to buy, Claire took the 12 hours of required homebuyer education. "Before I started the education

classes I did some research of my own, because I wanted to be prepared. But I learned a lot about budgeting, loans, mortgage payments, home repairs covered by the program, termites...lots of stuff." After the class and meeting with the loan coordinator Claire was ready to find her home.

Claire says she looked at about 15 houses in the fall of 2006. "Then I found this house and it was meant for me." The three bedroom, two bathroom, one stall garage, split level near 18th and Fairfield was just what Claire and her family needed.

Now as a homeowner Claire has security for herself and her family. But most importantly "the house is mine" she says "I can do whatever I want. If I wanted a purple house I could paint it purple. I'm not going to, in fact next summer I want to paint it white with black trim, and stain the deck red."

Claire will graduate with an associate's degree from Southeast Community college in the spring and plans on finishing her bachelors in Accounting from Peru State College. She has big plans for her future, working as an audi-

tor for the IRS, and for her family "all of the kids are going to college, and when the boys are old enough they will buy their own home, working with Neighbor-Works Lincoln so they can secure their futures as well." Content

Mayor Kicks Off "Stronger Safer Neighborhoods"


"There will be no slums on my watch," Mayor Chris Beutler said as he announced a new effort to improve neighborhoods. The "Stronger Safer Neighborhoods" initiative is a partnership among city government, non-profits and eventually the development community to focus on revitalizing problem areas. Beutler said the initiative will build on Lincoln's tradition of strong neighborhoods.

"Neighborhoods are the heart and soul of our community," said Beutler. "We have great neighborhood associations who organize and help their members look out for one another. The Mayor's Neighborhood Roundtable meets to discuss common policy issues and make sure the neighborhood needs are being met by my administration. The people of our neighborhoods are energized, motivated and ready to make a difference. Now, it's time for City government and our new partnership to join them."

The initiative will initially target core neighborhoods facing the challenges of aging housing, falling home ownership rates, increased crime and drug abuse.

The Stronger Safer Neighborhoods initiative will focus on three priorities:

- Bricks and mortar restoring housing and reviving commercial vitality.
- Good neighbors re-building neighborhood organizations and getting residents to take charge.
- Clean and safe streets focusing law enforcement and code enforcement to reduce crime and blight and establishing standards to measure progress.



A new Mayoral Aide, Jon Carlson, will work in the Police Department to develop goals, devise strategy and oversee the effort. Carlson is a property owner, former Near South neighborhood leader and former member of the City-County Planning Commission.

Landlords Are Supportive

"Efforts like this protect investments in the core of the City and encourage more private sector involvement, which is critical in revitalizing neighborhoods," said Lynn Fischer, President of the Real Estate Owners and Managers Association (REOMA). "The Stronger Safer Neighborhoods Initiative makes good business sense and is important to the entire community."

In addition to REOMA, the city's partners in the effort include NeighborWorks Lincoln, the Human Services Federation, the Lincoln Community Learning Centers (CLCs) and neighborhoods associations such as Witherbee.

Witherbee will be inviting leaders from these groups to participate in its monthly meeting and boost home ownership activities.

Michael Snodgrass, of NeighborWorks, thanked the Mayor for his leadership and announced related actions the organization is taking. NeighborWorks has applied for state funding to convert older houses from apartments back to their original uses as single-family homes. It is partnering with the national Rebuilding Together organization to help with minor repairs on owner-occupied homes.





New Office Building in Witherbee at 127 S 37th Street

The new one-story, 5,270 square foot, Trautman Office Building located at 127 S. 37^{th} Street has recently been finished and opened this winter.

Developer and owner, Gregg Trautman, invested \$430,000 to build the appropriately well-designed brick exterior office building that replaced two deteriorating rental properties.

Space has been leased on the north half of the building to Farm Bureau Financial Services, while the south half is still needing to be leased.

- **Urban Habitat Oasis.** Create critical habitat for birds, pollinators and wildlife in urban or rural spaces. June 26 from 7-8:30pm


Classes will be held in Lincoln, with specific location announced closer to workshop. Fees range from \$25-40. Pre-registration is required at least one week before the workshop.

sale ends. When the box hits a certain number, maybe \$50, take some of the cash into the house.

- Display your items well by arranging the best items for sale on tables. Lesser goods can be put on rugs or blankets spread out on your lawn. Large boxes can be used for various displays. One might have a large amount of stuffed animals while another, put on its side, will neatly show the spines of your books, organized by subject. When the boxes are empty, give them to buyers for their purchases.
- As your sale continues, you might want to start lowering prices. This can be done easily by putting up a sign: "25% Off!" Towards the end of your sale, you can change it to "50% Off!"
- Make a couple of large, clear signs posted on corners with the dates and times of your sale and your address. Arrows pointing to your house are very useful, especially for people unfamiliar with our neighborhood. Be sure to put a sign in front of your home so the buyer knows where to go when they turn into your street.
- If you only have a few items to sell, try to combine your sale with neighbors or family members. People are drawn to sales with lots of choices neatly displayed.
- And when your sale is over, please keep the neighborhood beautiful by removing your signs, placing whatever you don't want in boxes and delivering them to thrift stores or other charities.

Maids.

NeighborWorks Lincoln works with families and individuals to help them realize their dream of homeownership. Their program includes classes in financial fitness to enable individuals to achieve financial stability in preparation for homebuyer education. Mortgage counseling and assistance is provided for income-eligible homebuyer education graduates who can secure 0% interest second mortgages to help with closing costs, down payment assistance and repairs. Grants are available.

NeighborWorks[®] Lincoln is a non-profit, community-based housing organization dedicated to community revitalization through an active partnership of resident leaders, private businesses and public officials. The organization was known as Neighborhoods, Inc., until June 2004, when the name was changed to NeighborWorks[®] Lincoln. Michael joined NeighborWorks[®] Lincoln in July, 2007.

A questions-and-answer session at the end of Snodgrass's talk will allow for detailed audience participation.

Snodgrass has more than 14 years of experience in community and economic development. He began his career in community development working on developing single-family homes and multi-family units in the urban core of Kansas City Missouri. tires, batteries, computers and building materials that are re-usable can be dropped-off at this location on the day and time noted.

Waste items accepted for FREE: Furniture, lumber, screens, windows, doors, grills, junk, landscape timbers, picnic tables, swing sets, clothesline poles, broken fences, construction rubble, carpet, and non-Freon appliance (stoves, washers, dryers, and hot water heaters). These items can either be picked up at curbside or brought to 48th & "M" for disposal.

Recyclable items accepted for Ecostores Nebraska: They currently are accepting aluminum windows; plywood, 2x4s or any width, but 5ft or longer, kitchen sinks and faucets, stainless steel or cast iron; anything metal, brass, copper, etc. They do not need porcelain sinks or stools, windows or doors. They will also accept clean brick or cement blocks and walk pavers. Galvanized fencing and treated lumber is OK.

Items accepted for a nominal fee: Appliances with Freon (refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers, and air conditioners), \$10 each. Car/pickup truck tires \$3 each; large pickup truck tires \$6 each; farm tractor tires \$11 each. Tires with rims add \$1 each. Computer monitors \$20 each; CPU \$10 each; mouse/keyboard \$5 each.

Items that CANNOT be accepted: Ammunition/explosives; automotive waste; chemicals, televisions, microwaves, florescent light bulbs, grass or leaves (yard waste), heavy metals (thermostats, thermometers); liquid waste; paint or solvents; pesticides; propane tanks & gas cylinders; household hazardous waste; unidentified containers of waste.

FREE landfill brush disposal coupons will be available for pickup size loads of brush and branches from residential lots. Brush coupon may be used to take a load free to the landfill until the end of August. Coupons are not for commercial use, trash, leaves or yard waste. Mixed loads will be charged the regular landfill gate fee. A limited number of coupons are available and will be distributed on a first come first serve basis at 48th & "M" on the designated date and time of the cleanup. If coupons are still available after May 3rd, neighborhood residents may obtain one by attending a WNA monthly meeting (first Thursday of the month in June, July or August).

Volunteers are needed to assist refuse haulers with the block-by-block curbside pickup. Volunteers with pickup trucks and/or trailers are also needed

to help collect recyclable items at curbside.

Other volunteers are needed at 48th & "M" collection site to help direct traffic, unload, sort, and organize items, collect recycling fees, issue brush coupons, etc.

All cleanup volunteers should report to the southeast corner of 48th & "M" by 7:45 a.m. and have their own work gloves.
