## Witherbee Park Will Bloom After November Bulb Planting

The Witherbee Neighborhood Association with the direction of Fred Freytag were recent recipients of a mini grant provided by the Lincoln Parks Foundation. The mini grant enabled the association to purchase and install 5000 bulbs. The Bulbs were planted over three separate dates.

The first event took place on Saturday, November 5<sup>th</sup> between 10 a.m. and mid afternoon. The weather was great and 20 volunteers, young and old including neighbors, Witherbee Neighborhood Association members, Parks and Recreation staff and employees of FM Lawn Care spent their morning excavating, placing bulbs, backfilling and mulching. A total of 3400 bulbs were planted with only 1600 hyacinths remaining. Perkins Restaurant & Bakery donated coffee and muffins for this event.

The second planting took place on a chilly Saturday morning, November 26th, when FM Lawn Care employees spent a few hours installing 900 hyacinths. The third and final planting event took place on a great winter Saturday, December 31<sup>st</sup>. Seven volunteers, neighbors and a crew from FM Lawn Care made short work of getting the last 700 hyacinths in the ground.

The spring display includes more than 1,000 yellow daffodils, 1,000 pink and yellow Darwin tulips and 5000 purple hyacinths. According to Fred Freytag, the spring bulb layout was designed to provide both interest inside



the park for those visiting and also provide a colorful show for the vehicular traffic on "O" street. "We want to keep people interested in this gem of a park."

Hawthorne are amazing. By the next snow storm they enthusiastically headed back to the nearby home to shovel. A budding relationship with the resident and students has begun and this is just what school officials had hoped for.

The Bryan Students at Hawthorne have a one hour class each day when they are available and look forward to help out where needed in the neighborhood. There can be up to fifteen students to help with the needs. They can do snow removal, lawn work, window washing, general cleaning, and painting, and they can move furniture and appliances. The students are open to most any task they are capable of. This works as their volunteer hours program.

The Bryan Students at Hawthorne are working on several ideas to benefit Witherbee Neighborhood.

They plan to develop a program to deliver welcome wagon baskets to new residents by this spring. They also plan to collect old electronic devices such as cell phones, old laptops, portable DVD players and ink jet toner cartridges. These items will be sent to be recycled and the money received will work as a fundraiser for Bryan. The school also provides a food distribution center. Please keep these programs in mind when you are in need of them.

Witherbee Connect continues to meet with Tabitha to explore opportunities to use their resources. Tabitha is supportive of the Witherbee Neighborhood and that is very much appreciated.

#### **CERT Training To Be Feb. 10-11-12**


Doug Ahlberg, Director of Emergency Management for Lancaster County, has announced that a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training session will be held during the second weekend of February (10th thru 12th). Classes will be Friday evening, all day Saturday (lunch included), and Sunday afternoon. Place to be determined.

Lessons learned in the course can be easily applied by Witherbee residents to everyday emergencies such as traffic accidents, children choking, or how to fight that kitchen grease fire.

The course teaches preparation for disasters, assessing structure damage, using basic fire suppression techniques and resources, assisting emergency responders, conducting light search and rescue, setting up triage areas, applying basic medical techniques, and helping reduce survivor stress among other things. The emphasis is always on safety, with the students learning how to avoid putting themselves in dangerous situations.

Graduates of CERT training are under no obligation to respond to emergencies, and will not be "ordered" to report to any event. Involvement in CERT activities is always voluntary.

Soon after we moved into the home that we thought was perfect we started making



Tabitha's Green House project, now totaling four residences with skilled nursing care for up to 45 Elders, challenges the traditional nursing home model by providing residents a home-like atmosphere with common living areas, community dining and flexible schedules based on each individual's unique needs and preferences.

As summer heated up, so did the presses as Tabitha earned ink for its 5-star quality of care rating at its nursing and rehabilitation center in Lincoln along with Tabitha Nursing Center Crete and its Lakeview Care Center in Firth, where in June it introduced Meals on Wheels to the Firth community. Back in Lincoln, Mayor Chris Beutler helped Tabitha mark another Meals on Wheels milestone by delivering its 3.5-millionth meal in July.



### **Growing Witherbee Park**

Over the last several years many people all over Lincoln contributed to making Witherbee Park a reality. As plans were made to widen O Street near 46<sup>th</sup> & O there was an option of doing away with that green space we now call Witherbee Park. Neighbors Rick Bagby and Fred Freytag attended an open house and discovered these plans and set the wheels into action to save the green space and make it into a real park. Working with the Lincoln Parks Department a plan for improvements was developed and put on the waiting list for park improvements.

In February 2009, Mayor Chris Beutler announced Lincoln Cares was providing \$20,000 for the development of Witherbee Park. Since that was not enough to complete the proposed playground plan and park improvement the Witherbee Neighborhood Association started a fundraiser to make up the difference. Cash donations, a bake sale fundraiser, donated materials, cost savings by using vendors that did work at cost and a large volunteer group helped make the playground and park a reality in late summer and early fall of 2010.

Ongoing lawn and landscape maintenance is being provided free of charge by FM Lawn Care, Inc. Hofeling Enterprises (The Tree Guys) donated shredded wood mulch and FM Lawn Care employees installed the fresh layer of mulch in early summer. Other neighbors helped by picking up brush and litter after storms and planting some flowers. A neighborhood 4-H group crocheted and installed beautiful flowers on the chain link fence.

A few more amenities are planned for 2012. A piece of art has been created for the park and will be installed this spring along with a permanent picnic table. To bring early spring color into Witherbee Park, 5000 spring flowering bulbs were planted last fall.

Witherbee wants to say "THANK YOU" to all that contribute to Lincoln Cares by adding that dollar to their LES payment. Thank you to Lincoln Parks & Recreation northeast parks team for watering shrubs and trees and general maintenance. Thank you to all that donated cash, materials and volunteer time to make this small park in our neighborhood a reality.

While I have been credited with the successful publication of the *Buzz* for the last 25 issues, the real heros are all the writers and photographers who provided truly great content for *Buzz* 



# Meet Your WNA Board Bryan Hurst


Bryan Hurst joined the board in December 2011. He moved to the neighborhood with his companion Julie
