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# **Call for Volunteers**



# **Witherbee Connect**

I am not a writer, but I care about Witherbee Neighborhood Association (WNA) so I am again attempting to write for the "Buzz". The WNA was formed some years back. It came about because of a possible problem for the neighbors living in the area of 40th and Randolph. The plan was to develop a 16 unit apartmentcondo building, two, 8-unit buildings and a 100 child daycare facility on 3 acres of property between 40th & 42nd and Randolph & J streets. This project would have more than doubled the density on the block, increased traffic in this area and neighbors would have lost the feel of a quiet, residential area. When I think of the increased traffic this could have caused, I think of how difficult this could have been for me. I would have had problems merging on to Randolph, J, and H streets. Fortunately, with the hard work of several neighbors in the Witherbee area, the early leaders of WNA were able to persuade the City Council to deny the permits that would have allowed the project to proceed. A group formed, educated themselves and figured out how to solve the problem. They were creative and very detailed as to what they did. Thanks to this group the development did not happen.

WNA has lost some active members and volunteers within the past few years. We have lost some of those folks due to death, moving out of the neighborhood and just plain burnout. However, some have stayed, we have gained new people and some have returned. We have a very capable and fun group. WNA represents all of us but to me the important thing is they protect the neighborhood in so many ways. The activities help keep us connected and make us proud of where we live. We have leaders who go to the Mayor's Round Table and have knowledge as to how city government works. WNA is encouraging people to set up "Neighborhood Watch" programs. We are in discussion with city officials regarding the proposed parking lot expansion in Wood's Park. Monthly meeting speakers recently included a forester with the Nebraska Forest Service who provided information about the emerald ash borer (EAB) and how it will affect the ash trees in our community. The list goes on...

Right now we are working with Bryan Community School at Hawthorne with students to complete their service hours. They plan to help us with Stuhr Park clean-up and help deliver newsletters. We have talked with the school about many other ideas to involve the students in the neighborhood. We are hoping to take an advantage of their talent. I am excited about this partnership because everyone wins. Wouldn't it be wonderful if partnerships like this developed in everyone's neighborhood? I am also committed to Witherbee Connect. I love to get calls from individuals who need help with a small project like yard cleanup. Hopefully I can help by connecting them with a volunteer. I love working with the school and neighbors. It makes my day more meaningful.

I know I am rambling. What I want to say is if every household would give just a little bit of time and energy into WNA and neighborhood projects what an unbelievable neighborhood we would have for generations to come! I think we all want to make sure the neighborhood stays safe, clean and friendly. A family friendly environment costs more than money can buy. It is us, Witherbee residents, who make it special. neighbor. It didn't take long into my tour of their yard and garden to understand why they were nominated. The landscaping in the front yard was just the "tip of the iceberg".

Their back yard, viewed from a large window in their living room, revealed several evergreen trees and shrubs, providing color throughout the winter. Junipers lined their west property line, providing privacy.

The patio area was separated from the rest of the yard by shrubs and shaded by an oak tree. Several planters provided lots of color.

The garden section of their yard revealed a wide variety of vegetables, including kale, beets, broccoli, okra, along with zucchini, tomatoes and peppers.



In another area of the garden Vietnamese squash was growing, something new they had planted this year.

supply of peppermint, basil, thyme, lemon grass and sage, just to name a few.


Another section of the yard,




the space. Jeanette says most of her yard is a work in progress. She has added islands of landscaped spaces and



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
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# StarTran Changes – New Routes and Bus Stops



# **Ride Free through November** to draw interest all rides are free through November

As part of the new bus route implementation effective November 1st, new bus stop signs are currently being installed. You may have seen some of these signs already as the contractor is busy installing signs along all the new routes. Old bus stop signs will be removed once the new bus stop signs are in place.

With the new bus stop signs, on November 1st StarTran will be switching from the current flag-stop policy to a designated-stop policy. A designated-stop policy means you must be at a bus stop sign to board the bus, and when you pull the stop cord, you will be dropped off at the next designated-stop.

# **Emerald Ash Borer Seminar**

Missed our June meeting? You have another chance to learn about the approaching Emerald Ash Borer at a seminar at the Lancaster County Extension Service Saturday, November 5, 9-11 am. Registration is required by calling 402-441-7180 by November 2.

Many homeowners have questions about their trees and potential treatment options available to them. All ash species—including the popular cultivars Autumn Purple, Marshall's Seedless, Patmore, Skyline and Summit—will be at risk from this insect, along with all wild ash trees.

Nebraska Extension in Lancaster County and the Nebraska Forest Service has scheduled another Emerald

In order to make this a smooth transition for patrons, there will be a grace period. This means if you are not at the exact bus stop or do not know where the bus stop is, the driver will still pick you and inform you where the correct bus stop location is. The grace period will end on Saturday, December 3rd. On Monday, December 5th, the bus will only pick you up at a designated-stop location.
