June Yard of the Month 601 South 46th St.




The home of Steve & Nancy Holman is the June Yard of the Month. Their home was nominated by an anonymous neighbor who took note of the extensive amount of sweat equity put into the landscape renovation over the past couple of years.

Steve and Nancy have made 601 South 46th St. their home for over 20 years. In fact, the home has been in Nancy's family since it was built by her grandfather in 1950. The new landscaping was preceded by some extensive work on stabilizing and "water proofing" the foundation. This work took place from November of 2014 to March of 2015. With the spring of 2015, began the work of beginning anew with the landscaped areas on three sides of the house. Soil amendment for drainage issues and the addition of mulch were key to preparing the ground for plantings. They chose to plant shrubs and other perennials to the area to simplify landscape maintenance in the future.

In addition to the landscaping completed around the house they added an oval planter made of stone, surrounded by flagstone in the back yard. They chose to plant late summer blooming flowers and other pollinators in this area. The pictures of their yard taken for this article do not do justice to the work they have done in beautifying their yard.

Sustainability, a variety of color and ease of maintenance have been key to the Holman's choice of shrubs and plants. We congratulate them on their work and being long-time Witherbee neighbors!

Gus's company does not do any of the remediation work, but rather finds the cause of the leak, and then tells his customers the best way to fix leaks. Gus feels that gives his customers an advantage over other "Leak Experts" that work for Construction companies, giving homeowners the chance to avoid the "Gold Bucket trick." If your house is leaking, you really want to stop the leak, not buy a gold bucket to carry the water out.

Gus saves his customers 90% or more over the construction companies cost - and it can save his customers even more if they are a DIYer (do it yourselfers). Recently, one of his customers fixed a leak estimated to cost \$4,000 by one of those large construction companies, with a \$5 bottle of caulk.

Gus offers an additional service for those who need documentation of the leak. He writes detailed reports that help home sellers show their customers what caused the leak and how it was fixed. These reports can also be sued to get bids from others to show how the work should be done. This can be very helpful when a contractor wants to suggest an expensive alternative method to fix the leak. Gus charges a simple hourly fee, plus driving time (Gus lives near the neighborhood). Most investigations take about 1 hour. Temple Baptist Church as well as many other Witherbee neighborhood residents have been helped by Gus, the Leak Detective. Reflection on Living in Witherbee

Russell and Sherry Miller their two children moved to 341 South 52nd Street on a cold, rainy November general election day. The house was drafty and the bay window was threatening to fall out, but these problems were offset by the friendliness of the neighbors, who almost immediately invited them to the annual carol sing around the fireplace in Stuhr Park.

began a 39 year residency in what is now Witherbee Neighborhood Association area. Russell managed his recycling business at 4th and J Streets, while Sherry stayed home with Rebecca and Andrew and volunteered extensively in the Hawthorne Elementary PTA. The children developed close friendships with the other kids in the neighborhood. Summer found them spending hours in Stuhr Park, playing capture the flag or cops and robbers and winter sledding down the gentle slope toward the storm sewer. They played unattended until Sherry would step out the back door and call them home for meals or bedtime. Every 4th of July found neighbors gathering at the tennis court in the park to share fireworks and treats, always careful to bring buckets of water and clean the mess up afterward.

The Stuhr Park area was once a tree nursery and



the developer left as many trees standing as he could. Sherry recalls having about 12 Austrian pines removed from the back yard when pine blight was killing them. Neighbors were long term residents of South 52nd and Lenox Circle. In fact, four of the six houses on the Circle are still occupied by friends met back in 1977. The rest of the immediate area is changing with young families moving in, drawn by affordable housing.

Street is a favorite walk to Hy-Vee and Barnes and Noble. It's always fun to meet and greet young and old stopping at the Little Free Library in the Millers yard or to accept compliments on the flower gardens cultivated by Sherry over the decades.

Cheryl Hejl of 50th and L Streets began a tradition of potlucks in Stuhr Park several years ago to bring neighbors closer together. Sherry and Russ inherited stewardship of this program when Cheryl moved and are aiming to reach out further around the park to include more young families in this tradition.

Both are retired now, but Sherry keeps busy with the League of Women Voters and Russell with the storage business he has developed at what was the old Hill Hatchery property. Home maintenance is an ongoing chore and they are currently doing some deferred improvements, and plan to enjoy their home for many more years. They have found that living in the very middle of the city has many advantages, such as the food oasis of six grocery stores, and easy access to major streets.

Witherbee Neighborhood Association has been a strong reason why this area has remained stable and safe and the Millers say they are happy that WNA reaches all the way to 56th Street.

EAB Discovered in Nebraska

On June 2nd, the Witherbee Neighborhood Association hosted a workshop on the approaching Emerald Ash Borer, presented by Laurie Stepanek. Laurie is a Forest Health Specialist with the Nebraska Forest Service and a Witherbee resident.

The next day the Emerald Ash borer was discovered in Omaha, and ten days later in Greenwood. The city of Lincoln cannot be far behind. What did we learn? Ash trees will start dying in large number 4-5 years after EAB invades an area, with most of them dead ten years after that. Already stressed trees will most likely be affected first. Lincoln and Eastern Nebraska are not in the ideal growing zone for ash trees. Many if not most ash trees are stressed already. Adding the EAB will kill most ashes within the next 15 years.

Ms. Stepanek advised assessing your Ash Trees for health, economic, and sentimental value. Those healthy trees of good or high value would be candidates for treatment. She further advised to begin planning now for the eventual removal of your ashes. Treatment of high value trees is possible, but costs about \$100 per year, per tree, and will only prolong their lives, not save them.

The city of Lincoln is conducting a search for EAB now, inspecting the most likely spot to find the bugs, in



Witherbee Resident Begins Missionary Work in Africa

We frequently highlight individuals who live in the Witherbee neighborhood, perhaps because of an interesting life story or a unique hobby or profession. You may remember Alice Baden from an article published in the Witherbee Buzz the winter of 2014 which described her on-going home improvement projects at her home at 37th & H Streets. Our friend and neighbor has another story waiting to be written. She has sold her home, most of her belongings, packed a few trunks and is headed to work in Africa for the Rafiki Foundation. This at the young age of 70 years!



Why Africa? Alice tells us in her own words. "Africa has been of interest to me since the mid 1980's when a friend went to the Congo with Wycliffe Bible Translators. Her letters and stories made me want to see what real poverty looked like and be more appreciative of the freedom we have in the USA. I saved twice to go but each time the funds were needed elsewhere. After September 11, 2001, I had no desire to travel oversees so going to Africa was not even on my radar. Besides, my friend had since returned to the states." However, in 2013 and 2015, Alice had some nudging from friends. Neither of these friends was aware that the other had sent Alice an email encouraging her to consider traveling to Africa to work for Rafiki. This led to more research and before she knew it, she had submitted her application and had received the necessary immunizations to travel to another part of the world.

Rafiki means "friend" in Swahili and depicts the purpose of the foundation – to befriend orphans and widows in their distress (James 1:27). The Rafiki Foundation's mission is to help Africans to know God and raise their standard of living. To accomplish this, Rafiki established ten Rafiki Training Villages within the African countries of Ethiopia, Ghana, Kenya, Liberia, Malawi, Nigeria, Rwanda, Tanzania, Uganda, and Zambia. These villages provide living, educational and lifestyle facilities through Rafiki's five programs – Bible Study, Childcare, Education, Rafiki Institute of Classical Education (RICE), and Widows. If you want to learn more about this mission, go to www.Rafikifoundation.org.

Before making the decision to dedicate two years of her life to this work Alice traveled to Nairobi, Kenya, East Africa, in January. Once there she lived in a Rafiki Training Village for four weeks to immerse herself in the culture and life within a Rafiki village. After that trip she knew this was what she must and would do.

At the time of this writing, Alice has just returned from a survival training camp with the Rafiki Foundation at their headquarters in Eustis, Florida. Her tentative assignment as of July 2016 is Dean of the Rafiki Institute of Classical Education (RICE), Malawi, Africa. 

My first job was to load up the van - markers, tape, scissors, poster board, volunteer forms, notebooks, clip boards; gloves, lawn chairs, sun screen & water bottle. With the van loaded I set out for Mid Town Hy-Vee to pick up donuts, coffee. As I passed the intersection of 48th & O Street I glanced south two blocks to the 48th & M intersection to see if any neighbors had started setting up the collection site. I thought I saw a Dan's pickup truck but not much else. Nothing to worry about, it was only 7:15 am, the cleanup did not start until 8:00.

My request for coffee was greeted with a smile and then a grimace from the barista as she explained that one of the coffee machines was not cooperating. "No problem" I replied, "I am a bit early". The barista returned to her duties of helping other customers and trying to cajole the misbehaving coffee machine to start dripping hot water onto the coffee grounds. After several minutes a back up plan was implemented with coffee delivered from the deli

counter. With coffee & donuts in my cart I was on my way with only a few minutes delay.

As I pulled into the parking lot a few minutes before 8:00 am several volunteers had gathered which was great to see. What was a bit troubling was the lack of roll offs. It would be hard to collect debris if there was nothing to put it in. After brief chat with Dan Weslowski I was back in the van heading home to find the cell phone number for Neiderhaus Refuse. I found the phone number, called and left a message. Right after I hung up my phone rang. It was Dan, the roll offs were being delivered. Everything is ready to go.

Even with a few hiccups at the start it was a successful neighborhood cleanup. We collected over 30 used tires, a trailer full of construction material for Eco Stores Nebraska, a couple pallets of electronics & household goods, a roll off full of metal that was recycled at Alter Metal Recycling and one roll off of debris that was hauled to the landfill. The volunteers also picked up litter along major streets in the neighborhood. All in all it was a very good morning. The planning and organizing was worth it. The neighborhood was cleaned up and looking good for the start of summer.

I would like to thank Dan Weslowski & Bryan Hurst for volunteering to co-chair the WNA Cleanup with me as well as all of the neighborhood volunteers that helped with the Cleanup.
