WNA Programs MAY: How to Start a Pollinator Garden

Master Gardener Gary Bell will give a talk on starting a pollinator garden at the Witherbee Neighborhood Association meeting on Thursday, May 2^{nd} at 7PM.

Gary will discuss the needs of pollinating insects, pollinator plants, and how to create a viable habitat in an urban setting. He will discuss the importance of butterfly food plants and wild bee nesting needs. Gary grows his own native plants from seeds and will share with us how we can do the same! Gary will provide resources for starting a pollinator habitat in your own garden or flower beds.

Master Gardener Bell took entomology classes decades ago and recently decided to get back to his beginnings by starting a butterfly garden. He then expanded to include bumble bees and then to an allpollinator habitat in his own yard. He is now working on expanding it to be a pollinator prairie.

Master gardeners take forty hours of instruction and then volunteer forty hours of sharing and helping their first year. In following years they continue their education and volunteer at least thirty hours a year.

Annual WNA Cleanup is Saturday, May 4th

Wow! What a winter that was. Now that Spring is here it is time for the annual WNA cleanup event and make the neighborhood look great after such a long snow winter. The WNA cleanup will be on Saturday, May 4th from 8 am to Noon. The collection site will be along M Street directly North of Bryan Community School.

The 16th annual Witherbee Cleanup is a great way to dispose of unwanted items when cleaning up your garage, your yard & your home. Many items, such as mattresses & box springs and old furniture can be disposed of by bringing them to the collection area.

We have teamed up with Habitat for Humanity ReStore, located at 4630 Y Street, to recycle and reuse construction material and items such as windows and doors from building/remodeling projects as well as leftover lawn and landscaping materials nd furniture that is good condition. Stop by the store to see furniture, appliances or materials for next remodeling project.

Goodwill Industries will recycle and reuse most of the electronics and household items collected. All used tires are taken to Firestone

Complete Auto Care at 300 N 66th Street to be recycled. Complete Auto Care has been a generous cleanup partner for several years.

The metal & household appliances (washers, dryers, stoves, refrigerators, etc) are hauled to Alter Metal Recycling. Appliances with freon are safely discharged before recycling.

A limited number of Brush disposal coupons will be available. These coupons are good all summer and can be used to haul a load of brush to the Lincoln Transfer Station on North 48th street for free.

We need many volunteers to help pick up litter along the major street rights of way, around the schools and in the neighborhood parks. This is a great way to get some exercise and help make the neighborhood look great! Does your high school student need service hours to graduate? Litter pick up counts!

Delicious breakfast treats, coffee & juice are provided to all volunteers.

Items that CANNOT be accepted include trash, leaves, grass clippings, liquids of any kind (including paint, thinners, stains) ammunition/explosives, LP gas cylinders and CRT televisions.

If you need help hauling items to the collection site call Mike Kreikemeier at 402-477-9194 to make an appointment by leaving a message. The items must be easily accessible and placed near the curb if possible for our volunteers to pickup.

Many volunteers are required to make this cleanup event a success. Please consider joining us for a few hours to help clean up the neighborhood. We also need volunteers with pickup trucks and/or trailers. Vouchers are provided to volunteer haulers to help defray the cost of gas. Lincoln Bike Plan Discussed at February General Meeting

Twenty four residents of the Witherbee Neighborhood attended the February WNA General Meeting to hear Kellee Van

Bruggen speak about the proposed Lincoln Bike Plan (LBP). Residents had the opportunity to address their concerns about the plan. Van Bruggen is a Transportation Planner for the Lincoln/Lancaster County Planning Department and has been guiding the process. The LBP is part of both the long range transportation and comprehensive plans for the City of Lincoln and the County. According to the LBP website, "The primary purpose of the Lincoln Bike Plan is to identify an on-street bicycle network that builds on the City's extensive trail network and will provide safe and low-stress bicycle commuting and recreational opportunities. The plan depicts a comprehensive system of off-street and on-street facilities that will safely connect neighborhoods and destinations and encourage bicycle travel."



Van Bruggen discussed the process that was involved in creating the plan which was developed from data about Lincoln's current bike trail system and community input. Complete details about the plan can be found at https://www.lincolnbikeplan.com.

The planning process began in February 2018 and received approval a year later by the City Council to amend the 2040 Lincoln-Lancaster Comprehensive Plan to include the LBP. This is a high-level analysis that will involve more discussion and community input before it becomes part of the master plan, gets developed into a formal city ordinance and then gets built. Of note to Witherbee residents are the following proposals in the plan:

- Side path is proposed from internal trail and sidewalks of Woods Park to proposed Bicycle Boulevard on L Street
- Bicycle Boulevard proposed on L Street from Woods Park to S. 66th Street
- Proposed extension of existing Bike Route/Shared Lane on S. 35th Street (J to D)
- Keep existing Bike Route/Shared Lane on S. 44th Street and S. 52nd Street

Intersection improvements proposed at:

- S. 35th Street and O Street (grade separation)
- S. 33rd Street and L Street (signing and striping)
- 48th Street and L Street (Ped Signal)

- S 44th Street and O Street (signing and striping)
- 40th Street and L Street (Traffic Circle)
- 56th Street and L Street (Traffic Circle)

ANNUAL WITHERBEE NEIGHBORHOOD GARAGE SALES EVENT

As you undertake your spring cleaning projects, consider gathering items to sell as part of the annual Witherbee Neighborhood Garage Sales event! The annual neighborhood-wide garage sale event will be held Thursday-Sunday June 13th through 16th, 2019. Registering your garage sale with WNA for only \$5.00 means you'll receive a LOT of advertising that will translate into foot traffic (and sales!) at your garage sale. Your registration fee helps us place ads in the Lincoln Journal Star. Additionally, information about your sale will be posted to the WNA website, Craigslist, multiple Facebook pages, as well as local radio stations and event calendars. Think of the time you'll save when all of this advertising is done for you. Please spread the word about this opportunity to your family and friends in the neighborhood!

If you decide to hold a garage sale and register your sale with WNA, there are a few things you should know. First, you should fill out and return the registration form and \$5.00 no later than Wednesday, June 5. In order to guarantee your sale gets full advertising, it is important to mail the information in by the deadline. If you would like to register your sale after June 5, you will need to call the committee co-chairperson (listed below). Late registrations are \$10.00. When you are completing the registration form, keep in mind that you get to pick the days (June 13, 14, 15 and/or 16) and the times for your sale. In the days before the sales, a member of the garage sale committee will deliver to you a WNA Garage Sales yard sign as well as a stack of papers with a list of all WNA garage sales. Please share the papers with your shoppers to encourage them to visit other WNA sales.

Each registered garage sale participant will get a yellow sign to display in their front yard. Because we plan to use the yard signs for multiple years, we ask that you place the one you receive by your front door after your sale is over so that a member of the committee may pick it up on June 16th or 17th. Please do not write or mark on our signs!

You are also free to make your own garage sale signs. Please note that it is illegal to place garage sale signs on light poles or in the right-of-way. Also, after the sale you should make plans to pick up all the signs that you personally place in the neighborhood.

Still have items left over after your sale? WNA is again participating in the Goodwill Challenge. If you want Goodwill to pick up your leftover items, please indicate on the registration form. Goodwill will do one pick up, starting at 3pm on Sunday, June 16. Items must be placed by the curb at that time. Please see the box below for items Goodwill can & cannot accept.
