# Looking for a fun "feel good" project during social distancing?

In the midst of fighting the Coronavirus, Tabitha and Lancaster Rehab, like other long-term care residences, have initiated a policy of no visitors, including family. With no outside company to brighten their day, the residents of these care facilities could use a little cheering up! In response to this ongoing isolation, Life Enrichment staff at both Tabitha and Lancaster Rehab have worked with volunteers to organize a "card shower" for residents of these facilities. The goal – each resident will receive 2-3 cards over the next month or so. There are 70 residents at Tabitha and 210 residents who reside at Lancaster Rehab, so the need is great!

What's involved? 1.) The volunteer/family would send a card or other "Thinking or You" type greeting to a resident. This could be a family project with the "card" being a drawing or some other artwork. 2.) Your commitment would involve sending another 1-2 cards between now and mid-May. (Of course, multiple cards would be welcomed). We ask that the cards/greetings be mailed. (Everyone loves to receive something in the mail!) We hope to brighten the days of some of the older citizens of our city, so thanks in advance for your interest in this project!

## **Outdoor Fitness Equipment** Station at Woods Park

The City of Lincoln was selected to receive an AARP/FitLot sponsored Outdoor Fitness Equipment Station. AARP and FitLot want to install an exercise station in all 50 states and Lincoln was selected as the Nebraska location.

The Parks & Recreation Department determined that Woods Park would be an ideal spot because of its central location and complementary infrastructure. The equipment would be installed near the octagon park shelter. An amendment to the master plan at Woods Park to include this equipment was approved by the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board on March 12, 2020. This action now goes to the City Council for approval.

Both the Woods Park and Witherbee Neighborhood Associations supported this welcome addition

to Woods Park. If approved and depending Lincoln COVID-19 safety guidelines, construction could start in May.

Witherbee is a walkable neighborhood. Even if the churches are not able to hold services I can still walk over to my church and stop in for a break. I find it a great way to recharge and I am grateful that the church has remained accessible even if services are suspended.

My college kids are back home for a while. Even that is not so bad. We enjoy dinners together again. We have movie night every few evenings and vote on a movie to watch. During the rest of the day it seems that the kids are checking how many episodes of "The Office" it will take to conquer a pandemic.

Witherbee neighborhood is lucky to have several grocery stores and pharmacies close by. I have stopped running to the grocery store for just a few things. Now my shopping missions are more focused and planned. I am thankful that the grocery stores, pharmacies and banks have remained open and implemented extra cleaning and ways to keep distance between customers. Thanks to the managers and workers that make it possible.

Before the stay at home order I would try and stop in to visit my older neighbor every few weeks. I am not able to stop in anymore but I can give her a call, even though it is just across the street. Yes, being at home in Witherbee neighborhood during this pandemic is really not so bad.





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# **Home Security**

A full house was on hand at the March WNA meeting for a presentation on Home Security by the



Lincoln Police Department. Captain Mike Woolman of the SouthEast Team, Captain Don Scheinost of the Center Team and Officer John Walsh gave an update on home security in our digital age. Witherbee is generally a low crime area but there is always more we can do to stay

safe and secure.

First and most importantly, close and lock doors. It's surprising how much this helps!! Even if unattended for just a moment, an unlocked or open door can be incredibly tempting to thieves.

Officer Walsh expressed how helpful video from home security cameras is to LPD. Investigations are greatly simplified by time-linked video evidence. That person checking porches at 3 pm, car doors on the street at 2 am, garages at 10pm might be a person of interest to LPD.

LPD uses the Neighbors app from Ring to ask citizens if they have video they might be willing to submit to aid investigations. LPD sends a request to the Neighbors app to request any available video within a mapped area, a 'geofenced' request with a date and a time-range in the request. The geofenced request is usually a mile or closer distance to the location of the incident in question. LPD does not have a list of homes with cameras and does not know who has them. The Neighbors app forwards the LPD request to all registered members within the area indicated by LPD. LPD does not get this list. Those who wish to submit video can, it's voluntary. These requests from LPD are usually made within a day

of the incident in question. 24-hour data retention would cover most law enforcement requests, one week nearly all requests. LPD has dedicated staff to review video evidence and saves only what is needed to support a case.

Many of our WNA neighbors had questions for Officer Walsh, whose expertise was greatly appreciated. Home security video privacy concerns, LPD data retention, brands compatible with the Neighbors app, picture quality, lighting, tuning your camera system to avoid excessive alerts and more.

Home safety – never leave doors open or unlocked when you aren't right there even just for a minute. Home, garage, or car.



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#### Annual Witherbee Neighborhood Garage Sales Tentatively Scheduled for June

If you are one of the many WNA neighbors using this time of self isolation to clean out your cupboards, closets, garages and attics, consider gathering items to sell as part of the annual Witherbee Neighborhood Garage Sales event!

While waiting for guidance from our Mayor and the Lincoln-Lancaster County Health Department, we have tentatively scheduled the annual neighborhood wide garage sale event for **Thursday** – **Sunday, June 4th , 5th , 6th and 7th , 2020**. We will notify all registered participants mid-May if the event will be postponed or canceled. If you elect to send in your registration fee before mid-May your fee will be refunded or held for the rescheduled date.

Registering your garage sale with WNA for only \$5.00 means you'll receive a LOT of advertising that will translate into foot traffic (and sales!) at your garage sale. Your registration fee helps us place ads in the Lincoln Journal Star. Additionally, information about your sale will be posted to the WNA website, Craigslist, multiple Facebook pages, as well as local radio stations and event calendars. Think of the time you'll save when all of this advertising is done for you! Please spread the word about this opportunity to your family and friends in the neighborhood!

During the days of the sales, large yellow signs will be placed at various high-traffic points around the perimeter of the neighborhood to bring people into Witherbee. Each registered garage sale participant will also get a sign to display in their front yard. Committee members and neighbors who held garage sales in past years have heard many positive comments about the visibility of the signs.



If you decide to hold a garage sale and register your sale with WNA, there are a few things you should know. First, you should fill out and return the registration form and \$5.00, no later than Friday, May 29t h . In order to guarantee vour sale gets full advertising, it is important to mail the information in by the deadline. If you would like to register your sale after May 29th, you will need to call the committee chairperson (listed below). Late registrations are \$10.00. When you are completing the registration form, keep in mind that you get to pick the days (June 4,5, 6t h and/or 7) and the times for your sale. On June 3r d or 4th, a member of the garage sale committee will deliver to you a WNA Garage Sales yard sign as well as a stack of maps with a list of all WNA garage sales. Please share the maps with your shoppers to encourage them to visit other WNA sales.

Because we plan to use the yard signs for multiple years, we ask that you place the one you receive by your front door after your sale is over so that a member of the committee may pick it up on June 7th or 8th. You are also free to make your own garage sale signs. If you choose to do so, they should be legible and sturdy. Also, after the date, you should make plans to pick up all the signs that you personally place in the neighborhood. Please note that it is illegal to place garage sale signs on light poles or in the right-of-way.

Still have items left over after your sale?? WNA is again participating in the Goodwill Challenge. If you want Goodwill to pick up your leftover items, please indicate this on the registration form. The Goodwill truck will do one pick up, starting after 2:30 pm on Saturday, June 6th. Items must be placed at the curb.
