Yard of the Month - August

The Witherbee Yard of the Month for August goes to Paul Brown and Bryon Ronnfeldt. Paul is a chef at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, while Byron is an analyst with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Service.

They have been long-time fans of the Witherbee Neighborhood, having lived in the area a total of 27 years in three different residences. Their current home was a diamond in the rough that has been a labor of love restoring for the past several years.

It started with slowly transforming the outside in phases. The first area tackled was along the driveway by bringing in truckloads of dirt to create a space ideal for planting a variety of grasses and perennials. It was a lot of sweat equity by Paul, but the results were well worth the effort. The next year, they redesigned the walkway to the front door and added plants to complement the home. The final phase involved adding decorative rocks and a tree to the front of the home. This led to a new driveway, siding, and windows this year to finish the exterior project.

Although there is enough in front to keep any gardener busy, Paul enjoys getting his hands dirty and working with the variety of plants and raised beds of tomatoes, beans, and other vegetables in their backyard.

Paul and Byron certainly enjoy calling Lincoln their home and planting roots in the Witherbee area with no plans to leave.



Grant to Plant

Witherbee Neighborhood has been awarded a \$1,000 Strong Neighborhoods grant. The grant will fund renewing the flower beds in Witherbee Park. WNA was a leader in getting the Lincoln Parks Department to improve Witherbee Park in 2007-2008 when additional lanes were added to "O" street. In the fall of 2012 a group of volunteers led by WNA planted over 5,000 tulips, daffodils and hyacinths. For several years Springtime at Witherbee Park was celebrated with a burst of colorful blooms.

Over the years the bulbs have faded with fewer and fewer blooms each spring. This "Grant to Plant" project will plant another 5,000 bulbs throughout the park. Witherbee has teamed up with Boy Scout David Swanson, who grew up in the neighborhood, to help with this project. David will be organizing boy scouts of Troop 28 to help plant the bulbs as part of his Eagle Scout Project. Of course we can always use more help.



The City of Lincoln Urban Development
Department has money available to homeowners
who income qualify and have dead or dying Ash
trees. Called the Ash Tree Removal & Replanting
Grant Program, funds are available to remove
Ash trees from their property at no cost and replant a new tree!

The Strong Neighborhoods grant is sponsored by the Lincoln Community Builder Coalition. The coalition is made up of several partner organizations that promote community organizing, planning, and implementation efforts alongside neighborhood residents. This summer the Lincoln Community Foundation provided \$25,000 to fund additional grants and increased each grant up to \$2,500. For even more good news the grant can be awarded multiple times to the same organization. WNA will be able to apply for another Strong Neighborhoods grant to help fund another neighborhood project. Curbside Mailbox Question Resurfaces

Shortly after new homeowners moved into their home on H Street this summer, they were informed by the Lincoln Post Office that they would not receive mail until they installed a curbside mailbox. They needed their mail but did not want to buy and install a curbside mailbox. Noticing there was only one other curbside mailbox on the street, the married couple visited with neighbors who have lived in the neighborhood for many years and were informed that the Post Office similarly prodded new homeowners 13 years ago trying to get them to install curbside mailboxes.

Residents on H Street asked WNA President Mike Kreikemeier to revisit the issue with Lincoln Postmaster Kerry Kowalski. Kreikemeier and Kowalski visited and the bottom line remains as it was in 2011 – there is no requirement for new homeowners to convert a house-attached mailbox to a curbside mail box.

When Kowalski spoke at a WNA meeting in October 2011 he also answered questions from those in attendance. He said the Post Office encourages curbside delivery to save the agency money but that residents with mail delivery at their door may continue that service. Further, there is no requirement that they convert to curbside mail delivery within 30 days or any date, Kowalski said.

Other questions and answers from that meeting included these.

Q: Wouldn't curbside mailboxes on narrow streets create parking problems?

A: The Post Office didn't consider parking issues when it sent the post card.

Q: Did the Post Office consider that many residents believe curbside mailboxes detract from the character and beauty of a neighborhood and reduce the curbside appeal of homes?

A: No, we really didn't.

Q: When ownership of a home changes, does the new owner have to use curbside delivery.

A: The Post Office may ask the new owner to convert to curbside delivery, but it is not mandatory.

Q: Does the Post Office encourage use of community or cluster mail boxes?

A: The Post Office used to help pay for community mail boxes, but it no longer does. Homes in new developments are required to have community boxes, paid for by the builders. In existing neighborhoods, the Post Office will help neighbors by suggesting a location for a community mailbox.

Q: How can I get more information?

A: Contact your mail carrier or a Post Office station, call the main Lincoln Post office (402-473-1731) or access the U.S. Post Office website at www.usps.gov.
